One of our digital experts, Ron WB3ILX, will be presenting and demonstrating the Peanut application and QuadNet Array.


What is Peanut? It is one of the latest digital applications available for Android and

- 12. Having information tables at some of the local Hamfests.



<u>Eyeball QSO??? – What is it?</u>

An amateur radio contact made "on the air", commonly referred to as a "contact" or "QSO", is an exchange of information between two amateur radio stations. This exchange normally consists of name and location along with some station information and may turn into general discussions about anything.

But what do you call a contact that is made in person, "face to face" or in slang terms "eyeball to eyeball"? Well, amateurs humorously referred to this as an **"eyeball QSO"**.



History of LoTW and What Is It!

LoTW...You have heard of it, but what is it and where did it come from. Logbook of the World (LoTW) began operation in 2003 as a web-accessed database provided by the American Radio Relay League (ARRL) to implement a contact verification service among amateur radio operators. Using LoTW, radio amateurs (hams) can claim and verify contacts (QSOs) made with other amateurs, generally for claiming credit for operating awards, such as WAS, WAZ, and DXCC. This kind of verification formerly required exchange of paper QSL cards and submission to ARRL, a slow and somewhat expensive process. <u> Field Day 2019 – Time to get ready!</u>

2019 ARRL Field Day is June 22-23. It is time to start planning & getting your ducks lined up (in case it rains again). So, mark your calendars now. Field Day is always the fourth full weekend of June, beginning at 1800 UTC Saturday and running through 2059 UTC Sunday. The 2019 Rules will be updated/released in March 2019.

The **ARRL Field Day** is the single most popular on-the-air event held annually in the US and Canada. On this weekend each year, more than 35,000 radio amateurs gather with their clubs, groups or simply with friends to operate from remote locations.

Since the first ARRL Field Day in 1933, radio amateurs throughout North America have practiced the rapid deployment of radio communications equipment in environments



ranging from operations under tents in remote areas to operations inside Emergency Operations Centers (EOCs). Operations using emergency and alternative power sources are highly encouraged, since electricity and other public infrastructures are often among the first to fail during a natural disaster or severe weather.

To determine the effectiveness of the exercise and of each participant's operations, there is an integrated contesting component, and many clubs also engage in concurrent leisure activities (camping out, cookouts, etc.). Operations typically last a continuous twenty-four hours, requiring scheduled relief operators to keep stations on the air. Additional contest points are awarded for experimenting with unusual modes, making contacts via satellite, and involving youth in the activity.

At our May and June club meetings, we will be asking club members to sign up in advance for setup, support, tear-down, or to operate one or more shifts. We will also be looking for volunteers to provide equipment such as antennas, power cables, coax, computers and other necessary accessories as needed.



Setup begins on 8am on Saturday, the 22nd of June when we roll out the generator, cables, hoist antennas, set up and check out the radio equipment. Typically we use teams of two, one calling and the other the logging. Logging is done using special software.

They did that without GPS?

There was a time when Sextants and Chronographs were the state of the art in navigation tools! They were pretty accurate depending on the skill of the navigator and the accuracy of the Chronograph and could get you as close as 1/4 mile to your destination. Today, we take GPS for granted with an accuracy circle of 6 feet.

The passenger steamer SS Warrimoo was quietly knifing its way through the waters of the mid-Pacific on its way from Vancouver to Australia. The navigator had just finished working out a star fix and brought Captain John DS. Phillips, the result.

The Warrimoo's position was LAT 0° 31' N and LONG 179 30' W. The date was 31 December 1899. "Know what this means?" First Mate Payton broke in, "We're only a few miles from the intersection of the Equator and the International Date Line".

Captain Phillips was prankish enough to take full advantage of the opportunity for achieving the navigational freak of a lifetime. He called his navigators to the bridge to check & double check the ship's position.

He changed course slightly so as to bear directly on his mark. Then he adjusted the engine speed. The calm weather & clear night worked in his favor.

At midnight the SS Warrimoo lay on the Equator at exactly the point where it crossed the International Date Line!

The consequences of this bizarre position were many:

- The forward part (bow) of the ship was in the Southern Hemisphere & in the middle of summer.
- The rear (stern) was in the Northern Hemisphere & in the middle of winter.
- The date in the aft part of the ship was 31 December 1899.
- In the bow (forward) part it was 1 January 1900.
- This ship was therefore not only in:
- Two different days,
- Two different months,
- Two different years,
- Two different seasons
- But in two different centuries all at the same time!


